We might just have an Indian-origin Prime Minister in the United Kingdom. Just this week on Monday, Johnson's replacement was declared: Liz Truss, now the third female Prime Minister from the Conservative Party to lead the country. The lady who gave a whole new meaning to the connotation, "The Rock of Ages", her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, is no more. The second-longest reigning monarch in human history, and the longest-reigning monarch in England has passed away at Balmoral castle, her summer residence in Scotland.


