Crisis In The Middle East

As the seven-day long festival of Sukkot came to an end on Saturday, a full-fledged surprise attack was launched from the air, sea and land by Hamas. Hamas' vicious assault left at least 800 dead in Israel, and could only have been possible through months or even years of preparation. Despite always keeping their eyes on Gaza with surveillance drones, a highly secured border filled with security cameras and soldiers on guard, and an intelligence agency reputed to be one of the best in the world – Israel's eyes seemed to have been blind to the build-up leading to the unprecedented onslaught by the Hamas militants operating out of Gaza.

Hamas went through great lengths to keep information from leaking: even going so far as to withhold information from everyone including their highest ranking officials, lulling the Israelis into believing that they would be satisfied with just economic benefits. Regardless of Hamas' countermeasures against information leaks, with the Mossad's reputation as a formidable intelligence agency, it is unthinkable that they had no countermeasures or information about Hamas' plot. Have they grown so complacent whilst basking in the face of their own power that they disregarded the issues within their own country or perhaps they felt that their military strength had reached the point wherein they believed, and fatally so, that they could take on Hamas' weaker but determined force.

Israel's complacency has led to hundreds of deaths, countless captives, and carnage within the Promised land. Their ineptness allowed Hamas to disable

the Israeli military' cellular communications and surveillance towers along the Gaza border, preventing the duty officers from monitoring the area remotely with cameras which proved to be fatal to the border defence. Coincidentally, this infiltration of more than 20 Israeli towns and military bases, occurred on the 50th anniversary of Israel's Yom Kippur War, resonating with Egypt and Syria's invasion in October 1973.

But in this war, the enemies come from within their country, their foes are armed with weapons far exceeding the capabilities of an average militant group, and suspicions have naturally fallen upon Iran – whose modus operandi has always been to avoid direct conflict but to act through proxies like Hamas and the Lebanon based Hezbollah. In retaliation, Israel has pounded Gaza with airstrikes and stepped up its offensive cutting off the strip from food and electricity. I pray, however, that Israel does not commit the same mistake the Americans made, and go too far, thus causing not just the loss of thousands of lives and trillions of dollars but also their moral standing in the world.

As Israel battles Hamas, queries will arise about the massive failure of Israeli intelligence; and as in the Yom Kippur War, the day of reckoning will fall upon Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's government the moment the guns fall silent. In 1973, the Yom Kippur war cost PM Golda Meyer her position although her legend was made. Is this the fate awaiting Netanyahu, or will he go down in history as Israel's saviour?




