The Chinese hold, annually, massive meeting between parliamentarians and top representatives from every sector called the Lianghui. Which is, in plain words, a set of two parallel meetings between The Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference (CPPCC) - an advisory body consisting of the nation's business leaders and experts and The National People's Congress of the People's Republic of China (NPC) - a group of indirectly elected representatives. The Lianghui is held in March each year, however, this year's meeting is already off to a bad start, with the Premier cancelling his traditional "meet-thepress" session, a move that does not inspire confidence in the face of the numerous issues plaguing China. The Lianghui also has to address a massive financial crisis in the realestate sector that has dissolved the

life savings of many families that have paid for flats that will never exist; coupled with 11.6 million highly educated younger generation that's unemployed and trillions of dollars of hidden Governmental liabilities at the grassroots level that severely cripple policymaker's ability to inject funds into the infrastructure. The rising military expenditure (around \$250 billion) is also a matter of concern. However, as China has a One Party System, this meeting is only a facade - the Lianghui has never opposed a single decision made by the Party and never will, it exists solely to stamp the policies given to it by the Party. Every decision that is to be taken over the course of the meetings, has already been decided upon and all we are going to see is a highly choreographed performance. The 75th Anniversary of the Dragon has definitely begun.

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THE LEGACY OF HENRY KISSINGER

WHO EXACTLY WAS HE?

Born in Germany, Heinz Alfred Kissinger came to the United States of America in 1938 as a Jewish refugee fleeing Nazi persecution. Kissinger would eventually serve as the 7th National Security Advisor in the presidential administrations of and 56th Secretary of State for the United States of America and be celebrated and reviled in equal measure. Widely considered an effective secretary of state by scholars, his life is a study in diplomacy, controversy but above all, peace. He once said, "The nice thing about being a celebrity is that, if you bore people, they think it's their fault" although there was nothing boring about his life. He has been regarded as the architect behind U.S. foreign policy in the 70s, with significant influence for decades beyond.

WHY WAS HIS **POLITICAL LIFE SO CONTROVERISAL?**

Kissinger embodied the term realpolitik, an outlook based on practical rather than moral or ideological considerations. Criticism has been directed at a range of his policies and decisions including the pivotal role he played in orchestrating covert bombing operations in Cambodia and Laos, aimed at disrupting enemy supply lines during the Vietnam War, which were conducted without congressional approval or public knowledge (they resulted in significant civilian casualties and greater regional instability), his primary focus on strategic alliances instead of humanitarian aid and his involvement- in the 1973 Chilean coup d'état, support for Argentina's military junta in its Dirty War, support for Indonesia in its invasion of East Timor and support for Pakistan during the Bangladesh Liberation War and Bangladesh genocide.

WHAT ABOUT HIS DIPLOMATIC POLICIES?

Kissinger is remembered for having pioneered the policy of détente with the Soviet Union, orchestrated an opening of relations with China and engaged in "shuttle diplomacy" in the Middle East to end the Yom Kippur War. He also negotiated the Paris Peace Accords, which ended American involvement in the Vietnam War for which he was awarded the 1973 Nobel Peace Prize albeit under controversial circumstances.

WHAT WAS UP WITH CHINA AND KISSINGER?

Kissinger's death prompted Xi Jinping to send his personal condolences to the White House. The Chinese populace also deeply mourned his death, with the CCP state-backed national news channel dubbing him as a 'legendary diplomat'. What could prompt a nation so aloof and wary of outsiders to take such actions? It's simply because he is the man that made China what it is today. China was either Kissinger's greatest success or his worst mistake, depending on one's point of view. You see, Kissinger opened talks between China and the US. In his attempt to undermine the USSR, Kissinger held a secret meeting with Beijing, in order to pave the way for Nixon's visit to China in 1972. Before that historic move by Kissinger, the US had framed the world political stage as a "Capitalism v/s Communism "thing, and any and everyone with ties to communist countries would risk bearing the dangerous title of a "Red". Given how outspoken he was about opening the world market to China, China's current economic success can only be attributed to him. To quote S. Raghotham, "In Henry Kissinger's death, China has lost its greatest patriot."

WHAT WAS HIS VIEW ON INDIA?

Initially, Kissinger was party to Nixon's racial slurs and disgusting sexual rants against Indians, especially women, even insulting Indira Gandhi, as revealed in the Watergatescandaltapes. Later, herecanted and apologised, becoming a great votary of U.S.-India ties after the 1998 nuclear tests, viewing India as an ally, with parallel interests and admiring India's strong sense of identity.

WERE ANY OF HIS PLANS SUCCESSFUL?

Some believe that his work with China was a masterstroke that led to the collapse of the Soviet Union and victory for the US in the Cold War. However, poverty stricken China - which was on the verge of collapse due to Mao's insane revolutions is not the reason why the USSR fell apart, it's the massive technological gap that came in between the US and USSR, along with a lack of a Stalinistic iron grip that could have held the Soviets together. His relationship with the Chinese instead created a State that has posed a constant threat to the security of not just the US, but also the world. Kissinger used Vietnam and Cambodia in order to, perhaps, intimidate the Eastern Bloc by using vicious assaults in order to deter resistance and defiance. However, the massive loss of life this campaign cost is undeniable. Looking back at all his policies, his work in the Middle East could be regarded as his one and only true and authenthic success.


AVE: Do you have any advice for AVS students?
