To some he is a revolutionary, to others a statesman but to all he is the Pasha of the jewel of the Middle-East. Mohammed bin Salman Bin Abdulaziz Al Saud, more famously known as MBS, head of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia and the wealthiest family in the world. Born with a golden spoon dipped in oil, MBS came to power after careful manipulations of the complex succession line of the House of Saud. Once in power he set about establishing himself as a ruler with a difference. While he did not tolerate dissent, he also ensured that Saudi Arabia reconfigured to stay relevant in geopolitics with a new sustainable programme without the economic burden religious fanaticism. of

His aim is not only to modernize the kingdom but also make it a hotspot of tourism. He began by easing out on women's rights from allowing them to drive to travel without a male guardian as well as seek a divorce. Bin Salman is aware of the religious importance the kingdom is held by the Muslim world at large and yet he is unafraid to bring revolutionary changes to even worship within the country. His rise came with stripping the clerics of their powers, and containing the radical Wahabism at bay. His vision to recreate an entirely different city can be seen in his dream project The Line, a cognitive smart city that promises to be ahead of its

times. He understands well that Saudi Arabia's dependence on oil economy is not sustainable and has therefore begun to diversify in newer projects. In the Russia-Ukraine conflict, MBS has shown grit and refused to balk under American pressure to denounce Russia. He has kept a sharp control over oil production to keep Biden at heel. Despite the ongoing Israel-Hamas conflict the historic Abhram Accords with Israel is not yet a dead letter. Saudi Arabia under MBS has emerged as the big player in the Middle East countering Qatar and Iran with their multiple proxy wars.

While Saudi Arabia remains dependent on the Americans for military might for now, MBS has clear intentions to decouple from the USA and build its own military. MBS's relationship with India has strengthened under the aegis of the present government. From wanting to collaborate with India to building the India-Middle East-Europe Corridor Economic which could counter China's belt and road initiative, MBS is helping to keep the balance of power in the Middle East. In a world riddled with radicalism, MBS could stir the narrative away from religion and give it a wider perspective. Whichever way this goes, the days ahead will be demanding and the mettle of the Pasha will be tested in more ways than one.



WHO WAS HE?

Born on 14 June 1928, Ernesto "Che" Guevara was an Argentine Marxist revolutionary, physician, author, guerrilla leader, diplomat, and military theorist who was a prominent figure of the Cuban Revolution. His stylised visage has become a universal countercultural symbol of rebellion and global insignia in popular culture. Radicalised by the poverty, hunger, and disease he witnessed as well as by Marxist ideas, he became convinced that armed rebellion was the only solution to Latin American problems.

WHAT WAS HIS POLITICAL STANCE?

An anti-U.S. statesman, he guided the Castro regime towards alignment with the Soviet Union. The Cuban economy faltered because of American trade sanctions and unsuccessful reforms. During this difficult time Guevara began to fall out with the other Cuban leaders. He later expressed his desire to spread revolution in other parts of the developing world, and in 1965 Castro announced that Guevara had left Cuba.



WHY DID HE DO THE THINGS HE DID?

After travelling throughout Latin America in his college years, Guvera became acutely aware of the massive wealth disparity among the people: he saw miners who were "set to ruining their health in search of a few meagre crumbs that barely provided them subsistence"; he bore witness to the immense hardships borne by indigenous people, who were exploited by the capitalist machine of the US. He saw in Guatemala his dream of a united and prosperous Latin America come true; for the series of progressive - albeit communistic - reforms brought about by the democratically elected Jacobo Árbenz provided a breath of fresh air to a region plagued by dictators that put the interests of the American United Fruit Company above their own people. Árbenz cut up unused land from the United Fruit Company and returned it to the landless natives, bringing immense benefits to his countrymen. But then the CIA swooped in, staged a coup and overthrew the Government. If Che Guvera detested the US before, then this event cemented his immense hatred for US imperialism that drove him all his life.



WHAT WAS HIS ULTIMATE FATE?

Guevara spent months in Africa, particularly the Congo, unsuccessfully attempting to train rebel forces in guerrilla warfare. He secretly returned to Cuba in 1966 and travelled to Bolivia to lead forces rebelling against René Barrientos Ortuño's government but was captured by the U.S. assisted Bolivian army, executed on 9 October 1967, and buried in a secret location after his hands were cut off and sent to Castro for evidence. In 1997 his remains were discovered, exhumed, and returned to Cuba for reburial.

WHAT DID HE DO FOR CUBA?

In 1954, Guevara visited Mexico and the following year he met Cuban revolutionary leader, Fidel Castro, and joined his '26th July Movement' playing a vital role in the subsequent success of its guerrilla war against Cuban dictator Fulgencio Batista, who was overthrown. From 1959-1961, Guevara was president of the National Bank of Cuba, and then minister of industry. In this position, he travelled the world as an ambassador. At home, he carried out land redistribution plans and industrial nationalisation.

WHAT IS HIS LEGACY?

Che was an idealist and a hero to many, but beneath the facade of the martyred revolutionary was a hypocrite and a fool. Yes, he was well educated - compared to most people of that time and place - and he was a man driven by his beliefs, one that would take long introspective motorcycle rides throughout Latin America, helping out the poor and weak while associating their misery with capitalism. However, Che betrayed the very revolution he advocated; the revolution began with the aim of overthrowing Batista and bringing the power back to the people - but did the "people" get the power? Fidel and Che, took the power for themselves and kept it with them. Che brought about revolution, yes, but it came with bloodshed and death. He set up massive forced labour camps filled with dissidents, homosexuals, AIDS victims, Catholics, Afro-Cuban priests, "effeminate men", and all others that he deemed as "scum." All of Che's "unfits" would be transported at gunpoint; some would never return, many were raped, beaten or mutilated, all were traumatised for life. No evil was too great for his "revolution", and like Lenin, Guevara's approach was the utter destruction of his enemies via revolution, and the hated enemy deserved no remorse.

America and the EU are considering a new plan to fund Ukraine's war with Russia. They wish to use frozen Russian assets to fund Ukraine. However Moscow is threatening to reciprocate in kind if the proposal is passed. It remains to be seen how this will pan out; Moscow insists that it has a right to the funds, while Western leaders see it as a necessary step to help Ukraine recover.

A major portion of these frozen funds are private holdings of the citizens of Russia, and taking them away will cause massive amounts of resentment among the Russian populace. Even as the debate continues, Ukraine is not winning on the ground and it remains to be seen how it will end and what consequences it will eventually have, at the world at large.

IN CONVERSATION:

The founding Headmaster of The Assam Valley School, Mr. Paul Carling and his wife Mrs. Jane Carling, visited school accompanied by alumni on the 18th of March. AVE, represented by Editor-in-Chief, Atoti Zhimomi and Deputy Editor, Jigmee Pao Tamang, caught a moment with Mr. Carling to have a quick chat with him.

AVE: How does it feel coming back to AVS after so long? PC: I just walked the main drive from the headmaster's house to the school which I used to do everyday, so I was very emotional about the whole thing. It's been very powerful returning but the thing is, it's the same and it's different, the trees have grown so that's different, the outlook of the school is more mature so that's different, but there are some things that are still the same. The guy who used to cook for me - his wife, she was on the bicycle, she saw me and she got off the bike to talk to me. So the human things are still the same, it's still lovely to meet people who were witnessing 1994 when the whole school was starting, so things are different - it's a more mature campus but I think people are still the same and I don't think the students have changed very much.

AVE: What have been the most important things you remember as AVS' Headmaster?

PC: The most important things we gave to the first years was a sense of adventure, challenge and excitement, and actually, I think to persuade them that they - and we were very privileged to do so - could shape the future of the school. We all felt felt that we were really pioneers and that we could make it(AVS) a touch different from other types of schools, and I don't mean better, I mean a bit more different and a bit more balanced between academic life and sporting life and literary life and also a bit of community service as well. So I think that's what we tried to do was to give them a chance to mould not only their futures, which they were building from their own efforts but also to think about what makes a school, a school. But we were very lucky because it was a new school, starting with a few people, with terrific excitement. And I'm glad to say that judging by the people who started here, they've done and achieved terrific things, excelling in science, art or diplomacy.

AVE: What is the practice that you saw then that you wish had been continued in school?

PC: I'd like it to be a very balanced educational institute, you know different people have different interests and they are allowed to carry those skills forward but are also very tolerant and understanding of people with different skills, so the artist understands the scientist. In society, it's very much "us and them", so I'd like to see a tolerance and understanding and a joining together of people who look as though they are of different sides, understanding each other to take the whole thing forward, and I'm sure



it'll be there. Art, music, science and inquiry, literature, and social service, all those things, I'd like to see them, and I know that they are continued here at school.

AVE: What were your fondest memories as headmaster?

PC: This is actually the fondest memory, to a certain extent, but not as Headmaster; the whole of my family was here and the boys were growing up and they studied 5 and 7 here, and my wife is an extraordinarily gifted teacher and was responsible for a lot of the strength of english and arts in this school. We were also supported by the staff who were terrific, because they were entering into this new adventure as well bringing a huge amount of experience from other schools and from their own families as well and were willing to take a risk to do something which had something that was just a little bit special about it. The students were also very supportive of us - and we asked them to do some quite unusual things. I remember we used to have what I used to call "social service" - it was a club - in the afternoon, and so I had to take one of these activities and we used to have this assault course built into the trees with ropes and everything, and all of the boys gave up fairly quickly, but there was one tough little girl and she saw what the vision was and she went through with it, she was determined to do that - that was the sort of support from the students. We also had a very, very fine catering manager who raised the standards of food and of health, and we had the security guards as well. All of those different elements came together and that was kind of special as well and the things that the students have gone on to do is terrific.

WE BID ADIEU

Mr. Leslie Peter Watts, has played a myriad of roles at The Assam Valley School in his long stint of 29 years. From heading three of the 8 Houses to being a Quizmaster to a long tenure as the Mi/c of the Athenaeum, the AVS Debating Society, to serving a long term as the Head of Event Management, Hospitality and Alumni Affairs at school. Mr. Watts is a repository of all things 'AVS.' In his final term at school, AVE catches up with The Great Gatsby for a quick talk.





AVE: What would you say is your most profound memory of AVS?

LPW: What has always set AVS apart is its commitment to holistic education; developing wellrounded personalities and not specialists. To this end the school has always encouraged excellence in core subjects as well as in pursuits such as Art, Dance, Music, Dramatics, Debating and sports. Apart from this I will also remember being closely connected with students on many fronts. Of course who can ever forget this beautiful, lush-green campus sans pollution. I was fortunate that our son, Norman grew up in such a clean and enriching environment.

AVE: Do you plan to take up the simmering project of writing a series called "Letters To The School" for AVS? LPW: I may well do that as there are myriad memories jostling for space in my mind right now and I am sure there will be time in the months



ahead to pen my thoughts on AVS, apart from other writing work that I already have in the pipeline.

AVE: Of the many roles that you have played in AVS, which one has left the most impact on you? LPW: Having spent sixteen out the twenty-eight years at AVS as a Housemaster, I'd say my interaction with students on the pastoral front has been the most rewarding and enjoyable. I have learnt so much from young minds and I am truly blessed to have had the opportunity to interact with such talented students. You are very often challenged to change your perception of life, of established norms and values and this is how we too, as adults adapt and grow with the changing times.

AVE: What are your last words to AVS?

LPW: Change is inevitable, embrace it, celebrate it, stride ahead with it. However, the character and ethos of AVS must be preserved.
