

The Alumni vs. Present Students Debate

The annual TAPS Debate, a hallmark of intellectual engagement between The Assam Valley School alumni and present students, was held in the Williamson Magor Hall on 17th October, marking the spirited beginning of Founder's celebrations. The motion for the day, "This House Believes That Values Should Change with Time", set the stage for an of powerful rhetoric, thoughtful reflection, and sharp rebuttals. Speaking for the Proposition were the alumni: Surajdeep Singh (ISC Batch of 2014), a computer science graduate and senior content strategist; Deval Tibrewalla (ISC Batch of 2003), CEO and Director of Polo Hotels & Resorts; and Anirban Saikia (ISC Batch of 2010), Administration and Contract Officer at Matheson Hydrogen India Pvt. Ltd.

The Proposition opened with an intriguing analogy, comparing values to money, asserting that just as economies evolve to survive inflation and stagnation, so too must values adapt to remain relevant in an ever-changing world. They argued







that static values would render societies immobile, much like an unamended constitution unable to meet the demands of time.

The Opposition, comprising Zaheen Rafia Shah (Debating Captain) Aliden Jahzara Ovung, and Neilginryan Das, stood firm in their conviction that values are the unchanging moral compass of humanity. They emphasised that while circumstances and interpretations may shift, the core of values must remain unwavering to ensure social cohesion. To them, values form the backbone of civilisation and are not meant to be fleeting. They are intended to outlast it. After a closely contested debate, Team Alumni triumphed. Mr. Anirban Saikia was named the Most Promising Speaker, while Mr. Deval Tibrewalla was adjudged the Best Speaker, concluding an evening that truly celebrated the spirit of dialogue and intellectual camaraderie.




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
"CHARAN DAS CHOR"




